

Report on the second
Oxford Muslim-Christian Summer School

28 July – 4 August, 2016



The event

The 2016 Oxford Muslim-Christian Summer School was the second such event organised by the [Centre for Muslim-Christian Studies](#), Oxford, in association with [Ebrahim College](#) and the [Islamic College for Advanced Studies](#), London. **8 Christians** and **7 Muslims** (including 4 Sunnis and 3 Shi'a) shared in 7 days of intensive study exploring sacred texts, shared history and contemporary issues. The residential programme at St Stephen's House, Oxford, offered the participants (9 male and 6 female), who are all UK-based theological students or early career faith leaders, a unique opportunity to get to know one another over meals, on excursions (including punting on the river!) and during free time. The more serious side included lectures, workshops and tutorials led by Christian and Muslim academics along with help from [The Feast](#), [A Rocha](#) and [MADE](#), and visits to a local mosque and churches to observe worship and prayer gatherings. A particular highlight was a session at the Bodleian Library where the students were able to examine up close very early manuscripts of the Bible and the Qur'an. Another highlight was when 7 of the 2015 alumni joined us for a day to share their memories and subsequent experiences. This year's cohort is now keen to meet next year's – a pattern which is very much part of the plan. The programme, which costs £20,000 to run, was generously funded by various trusts without which it would not have been possible to run the school, despite the students paying £200 each. The testimonials in this report bear witness to the students' gratitude to the donors.

The aim

The aim of the summer school is for Muslims and Christians to learn about each other together; not avoiding or denying **differences** and **difficult topics** but addressing them with gentleness and respect; seeking to understand before seeking to be understood; speaking positively of our own faith rather than speaking critically of the other; so **equipping these emerging faith leaders to live together well**. However, the summer school itself is just the beginning. The purpose of the programme is that these emerging faith leaders will keep in touch with one another as they move into various careers within their **faith communities** and will start a **network** that participants of future Summer Schools can join.

As in 2015 a **reunion weekend** will be held in Oxford 9th-11th December. The students will give presentations of projects which they are working on



in pairs following the summer school. It will also give an important opportunity to cement their friendships and discuss how they can continue to cooperate together in the future. The reunion is a vital part of the process of building an alumni community.

Future plans

It is now hoped that funding will be found to continue running the Oxford summer school annually. As many theological students do not have the resources to be able to pay the full cost of such a programme the support of charitable trusts will remain essential.

It would be particularly helpful to secure funding for a three to five year period to ensure the longevity of the programme. At the same time CMCS would like to encourage other Christian and Muslim institutions to partner together to run similar schools in other parts of the country drawing on the experience and curriculum developed in Oxford.
